

Dan Garodnick's Post-Election Call to Action Pulls in Large Local Crowd

Responding to the post-presidentialelection worries expressed by citizens, Council Member Dan Garodnick hosted "A Call to Action: Advancing New York Values from Your House to the White House," on December 8, at the High School of Art & Design. The event, including an advocacy fair and presentation, was supported by Rep. Carolyn Maloney, State Senator Liz Krueger, and State Assembly Member Dan Quart.

A large crowd turned out seeking solidarity and ways to take personal action against the hatred and bigotry fuelled by president-elect Trump during the campaign, and the policies favored by him and his cabinet picks. There has been a 35% rise in hate crimes in the city since a year ago at this time. Another cause for alarm is the possible Federal defunding, in the next four years, of critical social and environmental programs.

The advocacy fair had tables with represen-

tatives from 17 groups offering information about their missions, activities and needs. The presentation featured comments by Dan Garodnick, an appearance by Faiza Ali, Community Liaison at the City Council Speaker's Office, and a panel of four activists from Planned

TBA Annual Meeting Is a Lively Gathering

Turnout was significant, on November 14, when an animated group of members came



together at the Vanderbilt Y for the TBA's 2016 Annual Meeting.

TBA Vice President Dolores Marsh presided in the absence of President Bill Curtis. Directors gave reports on their individual areas of responsibility, including Finance, Membership, Special Events, Zoning,

Grants, Parks, Environment, Newsletter and Social Media.

Council Member Dan Garodnick spoke, referencing Mayor Bill de Blasio's East



Midtown Rezoning Plan, which he and Manhattan Borough President Gayle Brewer sup-



ported, and which the TBA and Community Board 6 have protested in a public resolution (see Turtle Bay News, September 2016). Dan mentioned working with the 17th Precinct to eliminate idling tour buses, whose fumes are highly polluting, near the UN. He also said that he is responding to citizen complaints about construction noise by asking the Department of Environmental Protection to make corrective site visits when noise becomes too great.

Newsworthy Notes

Slow-Turn Box Installed at East 45th Street Intersection

Painted boxes with flexible posts called "slow turn boxes" are being installed in a pilot program at 100 crash-prone city intersections. One has been installed on Second Avenue at 45th Street.

The boxes slow down drivers making left turns with a 10-foot gap between crosswalks and where cars travel. Locations are based on a DOT study of intersections with the highest number of left-turn-related pedestrian and cyclist injuries. The DOT will be evaluating the outcome.

Waldorf Astoria Owner Plans to Convert 31 Floors to Apartments

Anbang, the Chinese insurance giant that owns the Waldorf Astoria, has filed plans to convert 500 of the landmarked hotel's rooms into 321 apartments across 31 floors. The building would become residential from the 14th floor up; units on the fifth to the 14th floors would be left as hotel rooms.

Anbang expressed its willingness to respect the interior of the hotel's historic appearance, and said that it welcomed an interior landmark designation, which was sought by preservationists and approved by the Landmarks Preservation Commission.

Trygve Lie Plaza Reopens in CB6 District

September 18 marked the reopening of the restored Trygve Lie (TRIG-vē l-EE) Plaza,

which commemorates the legacy of the first UN Secretary-General. CB6 began calling for the renovation of the

plaza almost 10 years ago.

Norway's Prime Minister was joined by elected officials and distinguished guests, including Trygve Lie's grandsons, and William and Arthur Zeckendorf, at the ribbon-cutting ceremony.

The plaza is located at the southwest corner of East 42nd Street and First Avenue. The hands of The Peace Clock, which is its centerpiece, form the peace symbol twice a day at 4:30 a.m. and 4:30 p.m.

Funding for the renovation was made possible by the Department of Parks and Recreation, City Council Member Dan Garodnick and private donations.

A Third Gender: Beautiful Youths in Japanese Prints. In Edo-period Japan (1603-1868), gender was defined by more than just biological sex, encompassing also age and appearance. Fundamental to this were attractive male youths termed wakashu. Neither men nor women, wakashu constituted a distinct "third gender," occupying their own place within the social hierarchy. This exhibition will focus on the portrayal of wakashu in Japanese art and the complex rules that governed gender constructs during the Edo period. It will present more than 65 woodblock prints, as well as paintings, luxury objects and personal ornaments.

Newly-reelected State Assembly Member Dan Quart also attended. He spoke about issues including the lack of intelligent urban planning reflected in the East Midtown Rezoning Plan and



the related need for affordable housing; lack of park and open public spaces; and the great height of residential towers that have gone up in his district.

The TBA works closely with Friends of Dag Hammarskjold Plaza, whose Director of Development and Garden Chair Anne Saxon-Hersh also addressed the meeting. Anne directed the extremely successful project that refurbished the park's Katharine Hepburn Garden.

Art in Dag Hammarskjold Plaza

Hamptons-based artist Phyllis Hammond has created five new sculptures for Dag Hammarskjold Plaza, titled "Tempo," "Alien", "Flying," "Gateway," and "Sign of Freedom." Exhibited together under the title "Beyond the Edge," the steel and aluminum sculptures feature narrow stem-like bases topped by whimsical, kinetic elements that rotate in the wind. Hammond uses an improvisational method to create her colorful, large-scale sculptures. The metal cutouts are based on playful, looping doodles on paper that she scans and modifies on the computer. Once the drawings have been refined digitally, the designs are cut from sheets of metal using a water jet machine. After the metal shapes are hammered, bent and welded into curved shapes, they are powder-coated with brightly colored paint. The sculptures will be on exhibit through April 16, 2017.
