located at the entrance to the Katharine Hepburn Garden near First Avenue at East 47th Street.

"We wanted to make the cobblestone platform more inviting and draw visitors to the entrance of the garden, explained Anne Saxon-Hersh, Director of Development for the Friends of Dag Hammarskjold Plaza. "The Little Free Library" is selfsustaining and makes the park more user-friendly in a neighborly way."

Founded in 2009 and based in Wisconsin, "The Little Free Library" is a non-profit organization that promotes reading through neighborhood book exchanges in 90,000 outposts around the U.S. and in more than 90 countries.

In addition to best-sellers, recent books up for grabs in the book box in Dag Plaza included a Frommer's Japan travel guide, a couple of Hemingway classics and a book on Charles de Gaulle.

The book sharing box proved popular from the start and the books are always changing," said Ms. Saxon-Hersh.

It's a great way to recycle books from your personal library to benefit others—and snag a book you've been dying to read for free.



MANHATTAN ESPRESSO CAFE

The Manhattan Espresso Cafe, opened in September 1993 by its owner Brad Bonnewell, a former Lintas Worldwide advertising agency account executive whose office resided in the Turtle Bay neighborhood at One Dag Hammarskjold Plaza.

After researching the famous grand cafes and cuisine in Torino, Milano, Rome, Naples and Florence, Brad completed training with the renowned Italian espresso brand Illy Caffè S.P.A. based in Trieste, Italy.

Over the past 26 years the Manhattan Espresso cafe has attracted a steady stream of Turtle Bay neighbors, office workers and international tourists staying in nearby hotels. The cafe is located on a charming tree-lined block at 49th Street between Lexington and 3rd Avenues. It has a replica of the original bench from NYC's 1964 World's Fair outside the cafe.



Manhattan Espresso Cafe serves traditional cafe drinks and coffees (in porcelain and paper cups), fresh bakery items including scones, muffins, croissants, pastries as well as bistro sandwiches (for example: Italian Prosciutto, Fresh Mozzarella, and Arugula on Focaccia Bread), along with soups and

REMEMBERING COLLEEN CURTIS



THE TURTLE BAY TREE FUND

It is with sadness that the Turtle Bay Association reflects on the passing of Colleen Curtis, the wife of 54 years of TBA President, Bill Curtis. She was a great supporter of the Turtle Bay neighborhood, and her work in that regard will be sorely missed.

She began her career as a stewardess on TWA in the days when flying was still glamorous, and people actually dressed up to fly on an airplane. When really very large aircraft were introduced, she moved seamlessly into the world of acting and directing first acting in regional and dinner theaters touring the country; and later, directing and playing the lead in off Broadway productions that highlighted the impact of notable women (think George Sand, Dorothy Parker).

But in her later years it was Turtle Bay that was her interest-she loved the idea of a small town set down right in the middle of the big city. Because of that interest, she was appointed to Community Board 6, and as such was on the Land Use Committee; working on matters that affected all the communities on the East Side-including of course Turtle Bay. She acted as liaison to the UN during renovations under its Capital Master Plan-first for TBA, and later for CB6. She was a member of the Lex Club, and most importantly, worked with and for the NYC Board of Elections, where she became passionate about preserving the right to vote, and all that that means. In remembering Colleen, the Association will miss her great enthusiasm for preserving the quality of life in Turtle Bay.

The Turtle Bay Tree Fund is an all-volunteer organization whose mission is to enhance the Turtle Bay neighborhood with seasonal plantings and to maintain the trees, flower beds and enclosures with a program of pruning, watering, litter-removal, and replacement on a regularly scheduled basis.

The Tree Fund is one of the largest of this type of neighborhood organizations with responsibility for nearly 250 tree beds in the area from 48th to 51st Streets, from Third Avenue to the East River.

The Tree Fund is a tax-exempt association that raises funds from neighborhood residents and others who care about street trees. Virtually all of the money raised is paid out for professional landscaping services.
