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UN Renovation Virtually Complete

urtle Bay residents taking a walk in front of the United Nations are sure to notice some impressive changes to the huge six-block complex. The more than \$2 billion renovation and restoration project, started in 2008, is substantially complete. While most of the work involved the interior of the UN's three main buildings – the high-rise Secretariat, the low swoop-roofed General Assembly and the Conference Building – the exteriors, too, have been cleaned and polished, and the areas surrounding the complex vastly improved.

Most noticeable, perhaps, is the bright sil-

very dome atop the UN General Assembly. It now sparkles, as was called for in the building's original design. Soon after the Assembly hall's opening in 1952, the dome started to leak and the repair involved a dark brown coating that remained until just recently. Now, the renovation has not only fixed the leaks, but has brought back the dome's luster, with terne coated copper cladding in the color originally intended.

Another improvement noticeable to area residents is a new visitor's entrance at 46th Street. Neighbors may recall that for years, UN security dictated that a large temporary

United Nations – and an attractive, glassenclosed screening facility greets the public near the avenue. A similar new structure at the south end of the UN complex is used for employees.

Noticeable, too, is a fresh, modern side-walk, with attractive mosaic insets. It replaces an old flagstone walk that, while undoubtedly attractive when it was first installed years ago, had become broken, dirty and stained. Embedded into the new sidewalk along the avenue's edge are security bollards, a precaution that is among many security upgrades incorporated in the UN's renovation.

Further work remains to be done. The visitor center on the lower level of the General Assembly building, including the gift shop and bookstore, still awaits renova-

Manhattan-bound LIRR trains now stop at Penn Station. The East Side Access project is designed to ease traffic at Penn Station and give 160,000 Long Island commuters an easier way to reach destinations in eastern Midtown.

"Those customers will save up to 40 minutes off their commute each day," Rep. Maloney said. She had pushed to get the money through Congress.

Residential Recycling is the Law in NYC

Did you know that the paper you recycle might end up as part of your next pizza takeout box? Or that recycled aluminum foil containers become new products proudly made in the USA? Think about reusing or recycling certain items before black-bagging all your trash for tri-weekly, curbside pickup by the Sanitation Department. Recycling cuts down on the use of non-renewable resources, reduces landfill overflow, and saves trees, which are the source of pizza boxes in the first place.

A Mandated Program

Recycling is more than a "feel-like-it" kind of thing. ALL RESIDENTS are required by city law, in their homes, to separate designated materials from waste for recycling collection by the Sanitation Department.

Residential building owners and LAND-LORDS MUST notify residents about recycling requirements, designate an accessible recycling area, and maintain signs explaining what and how to recycle.

RESIDENTS MUST keep designated materials separate from regular garbage and discard them, according to building management instructions, in properly labeled recycling receptacles.

How to Recycle for Curbside Pickup

In Turtle Bay, recycled items are scheduled for pickup very early on Thursday and Friday mornings. The Sanitation Department offers this advice:

- Put your recyclables out by the curb the night before.
- Make bundles of cardboard boxes, flattened and tied together with twine or string.
- Gather and place cans, aluminum products, plastic bottles, milk and juice containers, jars and glass containers into a single, large plastic bag.
- Place paper magazines, books, shredded personal papers and newspapers – in a separate clear plastic bag.

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CB6 Website Posts Mapping of 311 Requests in the District


The city has now made 311 request data searchable through the NYC Open Data Service powered by Socrata. To see 311 requests within the district, visit the CB6 website at http://cbsix.org/resources/mapping-311-requests-cb6/.

This site provides interactive maps showing the number, type, location and distribution of a wide range of service requests and complaints entered into the 311 system. Among the top requests within CB6 are Road Repair Requests, Broken Parking Meters, and Noise Complaints; but there are many others.

Every request placed since February 1, 2014 has been plotted. Red radial clusters (as appear in the map, upper right) represent the raw data against the area map. Click on a red cluster to zoom down to individual requests displayed as blue dots at the street level (as in the lower map). Click on a blue dot to display the details of the request. Below, are a table excerpt of individual report details and a summary chart of report categories in CB6, both of which also appear online. It is not surprising that noise ranks highest by far.

If you have an appropriate request or report, call 311. The more calls that report a particular issue, the faster it will be escalated and the faster the results.

Mapped Image of Request Clusters




Detail of Data Cluster in Turtle Bay

Just back from Italy, at work with Italian designers on her Spring/Summer 2015 collection, Ekavi's visionary Tina Theodorou – easily recognized by her signature radiant smile and straight black bangs – was ready to share her finds with her international clientele.

Born in Greece and a student of the classics, Tina was always intrigued by the way fashion enhances a woman's persona. In 1973, noticing the lack of boutiques in

New York City, she opened her own shop selling simple, elegant and affordable European clothes and accessories, attractive to professional women who worked or lived in the Turtle Bay area.

She found a sliver of commercial space on the east side of Second Avenue, just above 47th Street, and named it "Ekavi" after the queen of Troy renowned for her sense of style. The shop, with its array of brands and reflection of always-changing styles, has become a magnet for UN staffers, attorneys, corporate executives, and TV personalities who rely on Tina's flair for making them look great and feel good in what they wear.

Beyond importing smaller fashion labels from all over Europe and Israel, Tina designs her own Ekavi label. "I use Peruvian alpaca designed in geometric patterns of black and brown, toffee and charcoal, to make jackets, capes and three-quarter-length coats." She twirled a cobalt blue alpaca coat in the air to emphasize its silky, soft movement, and pointed to the fashion photo display in the window. "From Israel, I import these classic, casual outfits by Israeli designer Ronen Chen," she said.

"Scarves are the best accessories," she continued. "We feature delicate, colorful and warm handmade silk and woolen scarves by Christa Louise, a wonderful entrepreneur, who's created employment for many village women in Mexico.

"To tell the truth," Tina concluded, "it's really not Ekavi's or anyone else's classic clothing, or even the price of the clothing, that makes today's women look so fabulous. It's the care they take of their bodies and hair, and their individual styles in mixing and matching clothing elements. Ekavi is just here to help enhance the aura."

billion-dollar agricultural industry.

Krueger paints a dark picture of fracking in other states, citing Pennsylvania, where "Families found their homes unlivable. Houses vibrated and were filled with continuous noise. Air quality warnings and gas odors forced some to flee..." and "...a pregnant woman was advised by her doctor to relocate farther away from a drilling site." She also decries the "utter shamelessness" of the oil and gas industry as it woos citizens with denials of environ-

mental impacts and false promises of easy money.

While the Cuomo administration continues its official review of the impact on people's health, Krueger says that the proof on fracking is already in. "As elected officials, it is our job to weigh the facts and science, and then act to protect New Yorkers. It is time for both houses of the state Legislature to pass a bill banning fracking – and for Governor Cuomo to sign it."
