Turtle Bay Is Endangered!

he modified East Midtown rezoning plan is out there now and the effects of it upon Turtle Bay are horrifying. While it is designed to improve rapid transit, it spells a drastic change for the worse to Turtle Bay.

The new rezoning plan would allow for increased floor areas that encourage modern office towers with as few columns as possible, and would raise floor-to-floor heights. New residential units would be limited to 20 percent of any new building. Unused air rights from landmarks could be transferred anywhere within the entire

area, not, as now, to contiguous properties or properties across the street. The floor area ratio (FAR) would be increased to 18.0 and higher (21.6 up to 23.0 near 53rd Street; 25.0 along Park Avenue; and 27.0 around Grand Central Terminal).

The strip on the east side of Third Avenue, 150 to 165 feet deep from 46th to 56th Streets, would be expanded to 200 feet deep, a push that would overrun the low rise R8B zoning regulation that now protects side streets in Turtle Bay (FAR 4.0). That area would raise the FAR to 18.0,

MacArthur Playground: A Beloved Neighborhood Play Space

It is common in Turtle Bay to hear teens and young adults reminisce fondly about the "old days" when they enjoyed activities with friends and neighbors in MacArthur Playground. This very special public space has become an integral and even intimate part of the lives of many of our neighborhood's children.

The entrance to this gem of a park is at the intersection of East 49th Street and the FDR Drive, east of 860-870 United Nations Plaza. It is gated and fully equipped with

swings, a large jungle gym, a sand box, and a first-rate water spray. A turtle sculpture, donated years ago by the TBA, is a favorite of the children.

MacArthur Playground is an oasis for outdoor activities in the middle of our bustling city, designed to be enjoyed by both children and accompanying adults. Scores of children, with parents and caregivers, find their way to the park, year-round. It is a magnet on hot summer days when children arrive in swimsuits, carrying water balloons

and beach pails, to enjoy the tall water spray.

The park features benches throughout, tables, and seating at the entrance as well as the far end. Concrete tables with chess/checker boards built into their tops also serve for arts and crafts, not to mention birthday parties and other celebrations. Hence, all those wonderful memories!

teers who help cultivate the flower boxes and maintain the space, working with the Parks Department employee who is on hand daily. Volunteers also advocate for improvements and repairs, and help raise



funds. Recently, after weeks of phone calls, they succeeded in having the sand box replenished, even as other area playground sand boxes went unfilled.

MacArthur Playground has none-

theless reached the point where it requires major renovations if it is to continue serving the community's children. The city last renovated the playground in early 2009, at a reported cost of \$280,000. The improvements included all-new paving and land-scaping, and expanded plantings around



the perimeter to screen the park from the FDR. New and updated amenities were also installed: slides, swings, a larger spray sprinkler, a bicvcle rack and a drinking fountain. Some benches and trash bins were re-

At that time, the jungle gym received

placed.

little attention. Now, eight years later, the unit needs major work beyond fixes to its roof recently done by the Parks Department. The TBA Parks Committee is decid-

ing whether to make further repairs or replace the jungle gym entirely. The protective padding around various play areas is in dire need of replacement. Other improvements under consideration include adding a couple of shade trees near the benches in the playground's center, pruning the existing trees, and removing damaged layers of paint from the concrete walls.

There are other sorely-needed









changes: improved signage to discourage adults unaccompanied by children from using the playground's restrooms, and a means to assure that the gate latch closes fully each time park visitors enter or exit.


The playground is also overdue for an extermination, essential to control rat populations and relocate pigeons. The TBA is now undertaking an extermination project involving community residents, local politicians, and building associations and staffs. We are seeking funding for a comprehensive extermination plan, which would also replace and augment the current (damaged) trash bins with high-quality, rat-proof receptacles. We are also reviewing the effectiveness of trash collection in and around the playground.

Statement on Murders Outside of New York Mosque

In mid-August, Congresswoman Maloney released a statement saying, in part: "I am deeply disturbed by the



blatant attack on Imam Maulama Akonjee and his assistant Tharam Uddi. My heart goes out to their families. We must recognize that our Muslim community is far too often the target of bigotry and hatred. We must continue as a broader community to stomp out any discrimination that divides us. I am thankful for the NYPD's diligent work on this investigation and remain confident that they will bring those responsible to justice."

Called on Congress to Fund New Federal Opioid Programs

Maloney has called on Congress to fully fund the Comprehensive Addiction and Recovery Act (CARA) that President Obama signed into law in July. CARA created a number of new federal programs to combat opioid abuse. Although the final version of CARA has passed the Senate and the House, Congress has yet to provide funding for these programs.

Opioids have caused a severe drug epidemic in New York City, according to Warren Zysman, CEO of Addiction Case Interactions, and have claimed more than 28,000 American lives a year. "CARA could be a great step in the fight against opioid abuse, said Rep. Maloney. "Without dollars, however, CARA will be nothing more than another empty promise. Republicans in Congress need to put their money where their mouth is and allow a vote to actually fund the fight against opioid abuse."

Proposes Land Easement to Help Hudson Valley **Farmers**

Term limits will force Dan from his current office, and he is looking north to Albany



as a possibility for the future. Working with other city council members and the Scenic Hudson Land Trust, he is pursuing a project that would help Hudson Valley farmers stay in business, and continue to make fresh produce available to New York City residents. Cooperation between the two regions hasn't always been easy, so this is a welcome step beneficial to both.

Given the difficulties of farming as a livelihood, worsened by recent drought conditions and an aging labor pool, upstate farmers are being tempted to sell off large parcels of their land as its value increases with development and speculation. The size of New York City as a market could help solve the problems faced by farmers and also alleviate the disappearance of farms and open space north of the city.

According to The New York Times, Dan has "proposed spending \$50 million for a conservation easement program that would pay farmers the development value of their land and impose a deed restriction to permanently protect their land from development."

Steve Rosenberg, executive director of Scenic Hudson, said, "If we want all New Yorkers to have access to fresh, local food, then we must save the nearby farms that serve the city's neediest neighborhoods now, before they are lost to development. This modest, but visionary, strategic investment will make the city a national model of how to create a more equitable and secure regional food system."

Fights Actively for Transit Improvements in the City

Dan Ouart has reported success in the fight to restore \$1 billion in funding that will allow construction of the Second Avenue



Subway to move forward into its next phase. The Second Avenue Subway is a vital part of plans to increase access to public transportation within the underserved far east side of Manhattan, including Turtle Bay. Dan has pledged "to continue fighting to make sure this project is funded to completion."

Dan is also working with the MTA to bring more Select Bus Service to heavily-used bus routes in the area, to make sure that local service and bus shelters are maintained. and to help insure that elderly and disabled New Yorkers can access the transit system.

He is currently co-sponsoring the Move NY plan, which would provide for changes to transportation infrastructure in the city and its surrounding areas. Move NY includes increased and dedicated funding for large transit projects on the East Side, as well as funding for smaller projects, like bus shelters or streetscape improvements, that would be chosen by people in the district.







21.6, or even 23.0. Shame!

The TBA has consistently argued against including any properties east of Third Avenue in the East Midtown rezoning plan. The increased FAR, the unrestricted air rights transfers, and the push eastward included in the plan, would allow a wall of super-tall skyscrapers to rise up here in our neighborhood. The unused air rights of, say, Grand Central Terminal, could end up in Turtle Bay! Imagine the effect upon our homes!

Particularly desirable to developers are sites on wide streets and avenues, where the plan encourages developers to benefit from adding extra floor area to existing buildings.

For example, The Buchanan, located on Third Avenue and 48th Street, was erected in 1928 and has nearly 300 apartments grouped around a handsome interior court-yard. As one of the very few such buildings left in Manhattan, it should be landmarked and deserves to be protected.
