Bill Curtis: A Look Back at More Than 50 Years of Service to Turtle Bay Community



Bill Curtis, who is stepping down as president of the Turtle Bay Association after almost 50 years at the helm, leaves a legacy of significant contributions to the neighborhood, from dealing with zoning and land use matters, to park and landscape enhancements, to safety and security issues.

And while he is leaving his TBA post, Curtis will continue to serve the community in other capacities, taking on a leading role with the Turtle Bay Tree Fund, which maintains tree beds throughout much of East Midtown. And he will continue to support the TBA, particularly on complex land use issues.

Curtis's many years of service to the community began long before he was formally named president of the TBA, and it began quite by chance.

In the early 1960s, Curtis, a graphic artist then living in Brooklyn, was looking for an apartment closer to his office in East Midtown Manhattan. A recent graduate of Pratt Institute and an Army veteran, Curtis walked into the office of a Turtle Bay real estate agent, Peter Detmold, who showed him an apartment in a brownstone on 48th Street. Curtis liked the apartment, and almost immediately signed a lease. But his encounter with Detmold would bring him far more than a new home. Detmold, it turned out, was active in an upstart neighborhood organization, the TBA, and had been looking for a graphics specialist to help him start a local community newsletter.

Not many weeks later, the first issue of what was called the Turtle Bay Gazette was off the press, and

Curtis had begun his long association with Turtle Bay, and the TBA.

Detmold went on to become president of the TBA. In 1972, following the untimely death of Detmold, Curtis was named to succeed him, working alongside Jimmy Amster, who had founded the TBA back in the late 1950s. Curtis also was named a member of Community Board Six, on which he served for twelve years, including as Chair of the Parks Committee and later as First Vice Chair of the Board.

So for more than 48 years, Curtis has overseen some critically important neighborhood projects, all the while keeping his graphics arts business, Curtis & Company, thriving. Neighbors who are familiar with Curtis discussing East Midtown matters rarely have had a glimpse into Curtis & Company, which over the years has been responsible for creating logos and branding for such high-profile entities as the New York City Bar, Dunkin' Donuts, Manhattan School of Music, Absolut Vodka, and of course, the Turtle Bay Association.

Among his many efforts as leader of the TBA over the years—and one that has kept the area's residential character intact probably more than any other was a successful 1970s bid to stop establishment of a huge Long Island Rail Road passenger terminal at the corner of 48th Street and Third Avenue. Then in the 1980s, Curtis led the TBA's instrumental role in obtaining city approval of a zoning plan that has

limited the heights of buildings on many mid-block streets in the East Midtown. And in the 1990s, he spearheaded the TBA's efforts to rejuvenate Dag Hammarskjold Plaza and establish the Katherine Hepburn Garden.

"I take pride in my many years with the TBA," says Curtis. "While the issues the neighborhood is dealing with today are far different than those in the earlier years, the TBA's goal has remained the same—to maintain the livability of our East Midtown area for today, and for future generations."

One important side note to Curtis's career: He is a prolific artist, working in gouache and pastels. He chuckles when asked where his works have been shown. "Until recently, mostly only on the walls of my apartment," he responds. But now for the first time, his paintings are being represented online at Saatchi Art.

Still, Curtis will forever be a supporter of the neighborhood. "I look forward to continuing to be a proud and enthusiastic member of the TBA, as we see the organization grow, with new leadership, and younger, active, members to come," he says.

Update on the Homeless Shelter at the YMCA

In an online zoom meeting last month with city officials, city agencies and community members, TBA learned that the Vanderbilt Y has extended its shelter contract with the Bowery Resource Center (BRC) until June 30th. Two additional floors of the hotel wing of the building will be used as transitional housing for an additional 90 persons according to Sharon Levy, VP of Public Affairs for the YMCA of Greater NY. Overall, BRC appears to be managing the shelter operation effectively and thanks the community for showing compassion to the homeless situation. TBA along with the other neighborhood community organizations did not have any input into this 6 month extension. We will continue to keep you updated as we learn more information.



Overall Crime Down 42 Percent in the 17th Precinct

At the February 23rd 17th Precinct Community Council meeting the Council's President, Matt Roberts, and the NYPD's 17 Precinct Commanding Officer, Captain Aaron Edwards, discussed the latest crime statistics, while also recognizing two 17th Precinct Police Officers for resuscitating a female patron at a local restaurant.

Overall, crime is down 42 percent in the NYPD's 17th ...

According to Captain Edwards, the crime categories that were down include:

Robbery: 2 vs. 3 Burglaries: 8 vs. 16 Grand Larceny: 27 vs. 60

The crime categories that saw an uptick. Felony Assaults: 8 vs. 3 Grand Larceny Auto: 4 vs. 2

Two of the grand larceny auto thefts occurred at a private parking garage, one was poached from the street and another was a rental car that wasn't returned.

One responsible individual crashed through the gate, and ultimately crashes into several parked cars.

"Cop of the Month," Police Officers Elizabeth Perez and Sabah Ali, were recognized for their effort in saving a woman's life.
