### UPDATE ON CONGESTION PRICING

The MTA board officials approved congestion pricing, and barring some ongoing lawsuits, the program will be live effective June 30th. The affected area concerns Manhattan's central business district below 60th Street. That means every car entering every single street and avenue south of, and including 60th Street will be charged a toll.

Here's what you need to know about the fares:

- The base fare will vary from \$15 for a car, up to \$36 for a truck, and taxi drivers will be \$1.25 per ride.
- These fares will be in effect weekdays from 5am to 9pm, and on weekends from 9am to 9pm. Off hour fares will be about 75% less than the full fee.
- Vehicles will only be charged when entering the toll zone. Drivers with an E-Z Pass will automatically be charged the fee and those who do not have an E-Z pass will be mailed a bill to the address of the registered vehicle.
- Vehicles will only be charged once a day.
- "Crossing credits" will be applied to vehicles that drive into the congestion zone from the four tunnels that already have a toll, such as the Queens-Midtown tunnel. The amount will be \$5 for a car.
- DOE contracted yellow school buses, commuter buses, and certain essential city vehicles are the only exceptions at this time.

Ultimately, congestion pricing will remove about 153,000 vehicles from the streets of Manhattan below 60th Street, which will speed the drive for everyone and lower air pollution. Additionally, it will generate billions of dollars for the MTA to invest in the vital but aging transit infrastructure with the goal to provide more reliable service.
