DOLORES MARSH RECEIVES OTTY AWARD

We are very proud to share that our very own Dolores Marsh, President of the Turtle Bay Association, received an OTTY Award in March from 'Our Town, The Local Paper For The Upper East Side.' The OTTY Award, which is short for "Our Town Thanks You," recognized Dolores for her 40-year commitment to the Turtle Bay Association and its 1,000 members.

Our Town: Dolores Marsh: 40 Years Taking Care of Turtle Bay By Deborah Fenker, March 12, 2025

In the 1980s, Dolores Marsh began volunteering with the Turtle Bay Association. Four decades later, and for about 40 hours a week, she's the group's president.

Some people can barely balance their nine-to-five nowadays with all the other aspects of modern life. Then there are others, who run their own business while also dedicating time to nonprofit organizations. Dolores Marsh is one of the latter: She owns an advertising firm, and also serves as president of a large Manhattan civic organization, the Turtle Bay Association (TBA).

A lifelong New Yorker, Marsh has lived in Turtle Bay since the early 1980s. She joined the Association in 1985 as a special events committee member, soon progressing to events chairperson, and ultimately president in 2021.

The association's membership has fluctuated throughout the years, but currently stand at about 1,000, all of whom contribute annual dues to help cover operating expenses and fund events throughout the year.

Marsh is constantly in search of ways to boost revenue to help the cause. It's one of her many duties as president. Alongside her fellow TBA board members, Marsh collects and solicits dues, works to broaden membership, organizes community events, plants and maintains tree-bed greenery, and works in close conjunction with city entities such as the City Council, the Sanitation department, and the local police precinct.

A good attitude is crucial to the position: Marsh gets calls, often demanding ones, from locals asking what TBA



is going to do about the garbage, the homeless, the scaffolding, the noise. They are all valid issues, but not within the scope of her authority. All Marsh can do is relay the issue to the appropriate organization, but she rolls with the punches.

The work at TBA is no small job. Marsh estimates she invests as many as 40 hours per week with the nonprofit, and that's in addition to her full-time job running her ad business. She is not monetarily compensated for her TBA work but finds a sense of value and accomplishment in what she contributes to her neighborhood. She's also thankful for her co-directors as "a very active and committed" team.

Marsh is dedicated to community engagement; she likes to frequent as many local Turtle Bay businesses as possible, reminding them what it means to be part of a community, and hand-delivering decals that can be proudly posted by TBA members on their storefronts. Around town, she has become known as "The Turtle Bay Lady," a title she accepts with a smirk, but also a justified sense of pride.

PETER DETMOLD PARK RE-OPENS

After extensive renovations, Peter Detmold Park located between 49th Street and 51st Street along the west side of the FDR has officially re-opened.

The park honors Peter Detmold (1923-1972), once a tenant of the Turtle Bay Gardens on East 49th Street, and with fellow activist Jim Amster, launched the Turtle Bay Association in 1957, in response to plans to turn 49th Street into a major commercial thoroughfare. Detmold defended the rights of tenants and homeowners, protecting the quiet neighborly spirit of the area, now a designated historic district. On the night of January 6, 1972, after returning home from a meeting of the East Side Residential Association, Detmold was murdered. This park was named in honor of Detmold that same year. Originally, a crescent shaped inlet of

the East River, when the city filled it in to make space for expansion, NYC Parks acquired the property for Peter Detmold Park, in three parts between 1942 and 1951. On October 21, 1986, community leaders and residents broke ground for the \$794,000 restoration of the park that included a gazebo, a wooden entranceway, World's Fair benches, new asphalt and new lighting. In 1999, City Council member A. Gifford Miller funded a \$100,000 renovation, which included a complete reconstruction of sidewalks and fencing. A plaque in the gazebo honors Peter's friend James Amster (1908-1986), a strong force in the development of the park.

Coming to Freedom Plaza Path of Liberty: That Which Unites US

A new community-based immersive art installation, Path of Liberty: That Which Unites US, is coming to Freedom Plaza in May 2025. The exhibit will span six acres from 38th to 41st Street, east of First Avenue, and is made possible by the Soloviev Foundation. The installation will feature 45 large-scale screens displaying photographs, audio stories, documentaries, and interactive elements that explore America's founding principles of liberty and equality through personal lived experiences.

This new installation is being produced to honor the 250th anniversary in 2026 of the signing of the Declaration of Independence. Designed by multi-specialty creative studio C & G Partners, and directed by award winning filmmaker, director and producer Daniella Vale, the large-scale exhibition will provide a visual and narrative journey of the founding principles of the United States, framed by stunning portraits and immersive landscapes. America's founding pillars of liberty and equality will be featured through the lens of everyday Americans from across the country, sharing their stories and unique perspectives.

Path of Liberty: That Which Unites US will present an exploration of both the achievements and ongoing challenges of American democracy. Through powerful, large-scale environmental portraits and interactive elements, visitors will leave with a deeper understanding of the country's past, present, and future. According to Michael Hershman, CEO of Soloviev Group, "The installation will expose the world to the importance of democracy and freedom in a very personal way, while also demonstrating the resiliency of citizens who boldly forge a daily path toward realizing their dreams."

Outdoor Dining in NYC: What You Need to Know for the 2025 Season

Spring is here, and with it comes the return of outdoor dining in New York City! From April 1 through November 29, restaurants citywide can once again offer sidewalk and curbside dining, bringing life and vibrancy to our TBA neighborhood. Whether you're a restaurant owner, a local resident, or a visitor, here's what you need to know about this year's outdoor dining program.

Sidewalk vs. Curbside Dining: What's the Difference? Sidewalk Dining: Restaurants can set up tables and chairs directly in front of their establishments on the sidewalk, ensuring at least eight feet of clear pedestrian space remains. Curbside Dining: These setups extend onto the street in designated parking areas but must follow specific safety and design regulations to maintain accessibility and traffic flow.

What's New in 2025?

The city continues refining its outdoor dining program to balance business needs, pedestrian access, and neighborhood aesthetics. Some key updates include:

Standardized Design Guidelines: Structures must be removable for winter months and meet safety requirements. Better Waste Management: Restaurants are required to maintain cleanliness around their outdoor dining areas. Stronger Enforcement: The city will be cracking down on abandoned or neglected curbside setups.

How It Benefits the Community

Outdoor dining has become a staple of NYC's social and economic fabric. It supports local businesses, creates a more dynamic streetscape, and enhances the dining experience for New Yorkers and visitors alike. It also contributes to safer, more walkable neighborhoods by activating public spaces.

ELECTION 2025

The Mayor of New York City and all seats on the New York City Council are up for election. The Democratic Primary will be held on Tuesday, June 24, and the general election is on Tuesday, November 4.

AS YOU KNOW, the June Primaries are Ranked-Choice Voting. You can rank up to 5 candidates in order of preference: your 1st choice candidate, your 2nd choice candidate, and so on up to your 5th choice candidate. If there is a candidate whom you truly do not support, do not rank them, If you prefer, you can still only vote for just one candidate.

VOTER REGISTRATION - Monday, June 9 - Deadline to change your address. Saturday, June 14 - Deadline to register to vote

VOTING IN PERSON - Saturday, June 14 through Sunday, June 22 -Early Voting is available. Tuesday, June 24 - Primary Election Day. Polls are open 6am-9pm

VOTING BY MAIL - Saturday, June 14 - Deadline to apply online or by mail for a mail ballot. Monday, June 23 - Deadline to apply in person for a mail ballot.

Tuesday, June 24 - Deadline to submit a mail ballot. Envelope must be postmarked no later June 24
